

WHAT IS THE PROCESS FOR THE HOLY FATHER'S MONTHLY GLOBAL PRAYER INTENTIONS

The Holy Father's monthly prayer intentions are entrusted to the Worldwide Prayer Network and serve as a global call to transform prayers into concrete actions. Originally established in 1844 as the Apostleship of Prayer, this network, initiated by the Jesuits, was modified under Pope Francis. In 2016, he renamed it The Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network, elevating it to pontifical work status in 2018. Later, in 2020, the network attained the status of a Vatican Foundation gaining both canonical and juridical recognition.

Each month, Pope Francis, through his Worldwide Prayer Network, shares prayer intentions that express his profound concerns for humanity and the mission of the Church. These monthly intentions are meant to act as a compass for a mission of compassion for the world, encouraging the faithful to combine prayer and action in building a more humane and caring world.

These prayer intentions result from an extensive discernment process within the Church, incorporating proposals from various official congregations of the Holy See, and services of the Holy See across different countries. After several months of discernment, the Pope, having received the proposals, takes dedicated time to pray and discern the challenges facing humanity and the mission of the Church. Afterwards, he entrusts these twelve prayer intentions to all the faithful, providing them with guidelines for life and mission.

SAINTS OF THE WEEK (Adapted from My Catholic Life!)

Feast of the Baptism of the Lord (1/15) - The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord is a liturgical bridge that connects the Christmas season to Ordinary Time. During the Christmas season we pondered the Incarnation, Nativity, Presentation in the Temple, and Epiphany. Today, we see Jesus manifesting Himself to the world as He began His three years of public ministry. His ministry starts through an act of deep solidarity with the fallen human race. John the Baptist, preaching in the desert and offering a baptism of repentance, was not the same as our baptism today. Instead, it was only a sign of one's willingness to turn away from sin and turn toward God. Jesus, of course, had nothing to repent as He was sinless in every way. But that didn't stop Him from freely choosing to receive the baptism of repentance. Jesus chose to unite Himself with fallen humanity, taking upon Himself our own sins and suffering their consequences. He humbly allowed Himself to be identified as a sinner in need of repentance. This was done out of love for us and out of His longing to become one with us so that we could become one with Him. If we fully understood what happens every time we acknowledge our sins and repent of them, we would never grow tired of repenting. Every time we acknowledge and repent of our sin, we meet Christ anew, receive a greater outpouring of the Holy Spirit, and affirm and deepen our adoption by the Father in Heaven.

Memorial of Saint Anthony of Egypt, Abbot (1/17) - 251– 356, Patron Saint of basket makers, gravediggers, butchers, swineherds, motorists, amputees, monks, and farmers. Invoked against skin diseases and epilepsy. Canonized pre-Congregation. He lived an ascetic life in a desert hermitage for three decades until he went out into the world to share the spiritual insights he gained. He became an abbot to a group of fellow monks and counselor to followers (pilgrims) attracted to him for his reputation for sanctity. Everything he did was grounded in the practice of conversation with Jesus Christ through prayer.

Memorial of Saint Fabian, Pope and Martyr (1/20) - Died 250, Patron Saint of Rome, Pre-Congregation canonization. Elected pope 236 AD. St. Fabian was only a layman when he was named pope by acclamation. He was a very capable choice., In addition to his martyrdom and his divine election as pope, Saint Fabian is also known for being a good administrator of the Church, organizing the Church into various districts with appointed leaders. He had a heart for evangelization and sent several bishops as missionaries to Christianize Gaul (present-day France). Lastly, like many other saints of his time, he stomped out heresy, working to preserve the pure and orthodox faith.

Memorial of Saint Sebastian, Martyr (1/20) - 255 - 288, Patron Saint of archers, pin makers, athletes, against epidemics, and of a holy death. Pre-Congregation canonization. The crown of martyrdom was placed on the head of Saint Sebastian not once but twice. St. Sebastian was a captain of the Praetorium Guard until Diocletian learned that he was Christian. After penetrating his torso and limbs with arrows, they untied him and left his pierced body for dead. But Sebastian did not die! Instead, a holy woman named Irene came to bury his body and found him still alive. She was the wife of Saint Castulus, also martyred earlier that year. Irene took him to her home and nursed him back to health. Saint Irene died a martyr just two years later. After he had regained his health, rather than fleeing, he presented himself before the emperor and chastised him for his cruelty toward Christians. The emperor, angered by his words and shocked that Sebastian was still alive, ordered his execution by beating him to death with clubs and to be thrown into a sewer. After his death, he appeared in a vision to a holy woman named Lucina and asked her to remove his body from the sewer and bury him in the catacombs of Callixtus. She did so that night. A basilica was later built there in his memory. This church and cemetery remain an important pilgrimage site today. In the centuries that followed his martyrdom, he became known for his intercessory power, especially in fighting off the bubonic plague in the fourteenth century. More recently, he has also been honored as the patron saint of athletes because of his dogged perseverance.

Do You Know How The Rosary Came To Be? Adapted from Simply Catholic.com article by DD Emmons and Dynamic Catholic.com

By the ninth century, monks were reciting all 150 psalms, at first every day, but later every week as part of their prayers and devotions. They kept track by counting out 150 pebbles, placing one in a container as they said each psalm. People living near the monks mimicked this devotion, due to lack of education they couldn't memorize all the psalms so Christians prayed 50 or 150 *Our Fathers* (or *Paternosters*) each week. To keep count of the Our Fathers, they often used string with knots instead of counting rocks. The knots gave way to small pieces of wood and eventually to the use of beads. The Rosary includes six of Catholicism's most familiar prayers: the Apostles' Creed, the Our Father, the Hail Mary, the Glory Be, the Fátima Prayer ("O My Jesus") and the Hail Holy Queen. The inclusion of these prayers in the Rosary did not happen overnight but was a lengthy evolution down through the centuries. It evolved to what we say today moving from each decade, instead of each bead, accompanied by a meditation on the life of Christ and Mary.

The **Hail Mary prayer** came together slowly. It took more than a thousand years. The earliest version simply added Mary's name to the message delivered by the angel Gabriel to Mary: "Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee" (Luke 1:28). Around 1050 AD, the words Elizabeth used to greet Mary during the Visitation were added: "Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb" (Luke 1:42). In 1261, Pope Urban IV added the name of Jesus to the end of Elizabeth's words. St. Peter Canisius published the Hail Mary in his 1555 Catechism with almost the entire final petition: "Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners." Eleven years later, the Catechism of the Council of Trent (a work that Canisius was instrumental in creating) included, for the first time, the entire final petition, concluding with the words "now and at the hour of our death. Amen." The version of the Hail Mary we pray today was officially approval in 1568. In 1569, Pope St. Pius V (r. 1566-72) publicly decreed and encouraged the universal use of the Rosary. It remained the same until the Fatima Prayer was added, though not universally used, yet. From the 16th century until the 21st century there were three sets of mysteries: the Joyful, the Glorious and the Sorrowful. But in 2001, Pope St. John Paul II added the Mysteries of Light. The intent was to include meditations on the time in Jesus' life between His incarnation (a Joyful Mystery) and His passion (a Sorrowful Mystery).

Do You Know Why We Added The Fatima Prayer To The Rosary? Adapted from Catholic Link article written by Becky Roach and EWTN

On May 13, 1917, the Blessed Mother appeared for the first time to three shepherd children in Fatima, Portugal. Each time our Blessed Mother visited Jacinta, Francisco, and Lucia, she gave some specific instructions to the children to let the faithful know they must stop offending our Lord. In her third appearance on July 13, 1917, she asked that the following prayer be included at the conclusion of every Rosary decade.

"Say the Rosary everyday to obtain peace for the world. And after each decade, say the following prayer: O, my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell. Lead all souls to heaven, especially those most in need of thy mercy." OUR LADY OF FATIMA

Today, we call this prayer the Fatima Prayer, but many Catholics still do not know that Our Lady of Fatima requested it be prayed at the end of each decade of the rosary. It was officially approved for use by the Catholic Church in 1930. Though it is an optional prayer of the Rosary, it is *the* prayer that Mary herself encourages us to include in our devotion.

Why Pray The Rosary?

Why does Mary so deeply desire us to pray the Holy Rosary daily? Why did she specifically ask us to intercede on the behalf of all <u>souls</u> for mercy? Our Blessed Mother wants to see all of her children in Heaven one day, and she weeps for those who have fallen into sin and away from God. She knows that the Rosary is the tool we can use to restore <u>peace</u> and mercy in our broken world.

What Archbishop Sheen said . . .

"The rosary is the book of the blind, where souls see and there enact the greatest drama of love the world has ever known; it is the book of the simple, which initiates them into mysteries and knowledge more satisfying than the education of other men; it is the book of the aged, whose eyes close upon the shadow of this world, and open on the substance of the next. The power of the rosary is beyond description."

What Pope St. Paul VI said . . .

"Meditation on the mysteries of the Rosary . . . can be an excellent preparation for the celebration of those same mysteries in the liturgical actions [i.e. the Mass] and can also become a continuing echo thereof"

What Pope St. John XXIII said . . .

"The Rosary is a magnificent and universal prayer for the needs of the Church, the nations and the entire world"
