THOUGHTS ON THE EPIPHANY OF OUR LORD

In Jesus' time, a gift of gold acknowledged the kingship of the recipient. A gift of frankincense, a type of incense, was used in his time to worship God, while the gift of myrrh, an oil, was used to anoint the dying. These gifts remind us of Jesus' kingship, divinity, and his dying for us. What gifts do we have for Jesus?

Taking a hint from the wise men, acknowledge Jesus as king, and better than gold, pledge obedience to him. Burning incense to pay homage to Jesus' divinity is great, better is spending time in prayer throughout the day. As for the gift of myrrh, we can give Jesus the crosses we bear. Let Epiphany remind us to offer our lives to Jesus each day.

SAINTS OF THE WEEK (Adapted from My Catholic Life!)

Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord (1/7) - Celebrated on January 6, or the first Sunday after January 1 if not a Holy Day of Obligation. This day honors the visit of the Magi to the Christ Child. It was first celebrated at the end of the second century and originated in the Eastern Church. It was designated a feast day at the Council of Tours in 567. At the time of Jesus' birth, it was commonly believed that a new star would appear birth, it was commonly believed that a new star would appear when a new ruler was born. The Father in Heaven used this belief to honor His Son, the new King. When three astrologers from the East, the Magi, saw this "new star," they chose to follow it to discover the new King. Pointing the way, in the form of a star, was creation itself. The word "Epiphany" means "manifestation," inviting us to look at how Christ is manifest in our own hearts. First, when the Magi saw a sign from the heavens that pointed to a new King, they stopped everything and departed in haste to find Him. The Magi brought the Christ Child gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrth. Gold symbolized Child gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Gold symbolized kingship. When we ponder the gift of gold given to the Christ Child, we are inspired to give Him our own symbolic gold by prayerfully acknowledging Him as our King to whom we pledge complete submission. Used in worship to symbolize prayers rising to heaven, frankincense symbolizes the Christ Child's divinity. We offer frankincense to Christ when we acknowledge His divine nature. Often used in burial, myrrh honors the Christ Child who came to give His life as a sacrifice for many. We offer myrrh to profess our belief in the saving power of Christ's death on the Cross and our need for that gift of salvation. As we celebrate the Solemnity of the Epiphany, see it as a historical event in which you are invited to share. God wants to manifest Himself to you today. When this happens, respond with faith and worship, giving God the greatest glory by giving Him your very life and offering Him your spiritual gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

Feast of the Baptism of the Lord (1/8) - The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord is a liturgical bridge that connects the Christmas season to Ordinary Time. During the Christmas season we pondered the Incarnation, Nativity, Presentation in the Temple, and Epiphany. Today, we see Jesus manifesting Himself to the world as He began His three years of public ministry. Jesus begins His ministry through an act of deep solidarity with the fallen human race. John the Baptist had been preaching in the desert and offering a baptism of repentance. Jesus chose to unite Himself with fallen humanity, taking upon Himself our own sins and suffering their consequences. He humbly allowed Himself to be identified as a sinner in need of repentance. This was done out of love for us and out of His longing to become one with us so that we could become one with Him.

Memorial of Saint Hilary, Bishop and Doctor of the Church (1/13) - c. 315–367, Patron Saint of children academically behind, children learning to walk, mothers, and the sick. He is invoked against rheumatism and snakebites. Pre-Congregation canonization and was proclaimed a Doctor of the Church in 1851 by Pope Pius IX. Born into a wealthy pagan family in Poitiers, France, Hilary was well educated in the classics. He knew that he did not exist for the sole purpose of seeking pleasure, enjoying leisure, or obtaining wealth. He reasoned that the human soul did not exist simply to die.

Instead, it must exist for something more, something eternal, something glorious. Hilary finally found what he was searching for when he stumbled upon the Scriptures. He was first struck by the mysterious name of God in the Old Testament: "I AM WHO I AM." God had revealed Himself as eternal, without beginning or end - Existence itself. Then Hilary discovered the Son of God in the Gospel of John 1:1–14. Hilary had the will to believe, and in the years that followed he was given the power and gift to understand the beauty, mystery, omnipotence, and nature of the Most Holy Trinity. Shortly after these discoveries of faith, Hilary was baptized a Christian and went on to defend the doctrine of the Trinity against the "insanity and ignorance of men." He so impressed the faithful that they chose him to be their bishop, a dignity to which he reluctantly agreed. His effectiveness came not only from his clear teaching, but also from his conciliatory approach and resolute determination. He was a true pastor who burned with a desire that everyone come to a deeper knowledge of the One God - Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.
